Legal Writing 3 and Legal Writing 4

All sections of Legal Writing 3 are offered as General Practice sections. <u>Legal Writing 4</u> focuses on advanced research and writing skills in a variety of doctrinal areas and on creating legal instruments common to these areas. All second-year Day Division students were required to take Legal Writing 3 in the Fall semester, except for those who took a Legal Writing 4 Equivalency Class. ADR IN THE WORKPLACE (2 credits)

Prof. Totonchi

Course number: 427-01

Monday, January 9 - Friday, January 13

Pass/fail not available. This intensive class explores the doctrine and process of labor arbitration, employment mediation and employment arbitration. Students will participate in selecting neutral arbitrators, prepping for and conducting labor arbitrations, an employment mediation and an employment arbitration. There will be comments, critiques and suggestions at every step along the way. The condensed schedule should help you focus on mediation and arbitration as you would in real life. Class will meet for approximately 21 hours during the week (the hours will vary depending on the day, and there will be no in-person class session on Wednesday in order for the students to prepare for the rest of the week), with approximately 6 hours of additional instruction through distance learning techniques. If you enroll in the course and later decide not to take it, you must drop it no later than Wednesday, December 28, or you will be charged full tuition for the course unless another student takes your place. Priority for this class will be given to students seeking the Labor and Employment Law Certificate or the Workplace Litigation and Alternative Dispute Resolution Certificate.

INTENSIVE TRIAL ADVOCACY 1 (3 credits)

Prof. Erickson and faculty Course number: 541-01

Saturday, January 7 - Saturday, January 14

Prerequisite: Evidence. Pass/fail not available. This is an intensive week-long version of the regular Trial Advocacy 1 class. Classes will meet from 8:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. each day, including the intervening Sunday. If you enroll in the course and later decide not to take it, you must drop it by Wednesday, December 28,or you will be charged full tuition for the course unless another student takes your seat. Note: You must take Trial Advocacy 2 in the Spring semester if you take Intensive Trial Advocacy.

STRATEGIC PROBLEM-SOLVING AND THE LAW (2 or 3 credits)

Profs. Baker and Johnson Course number: 169-01

Monday, January 9 - Friday, January 13

Pass/fail only. This course will immerse students in complex, contemporary legal problems that demand creative, sophisticated analysis and prompt action. Working entirely in groups, students will delve into different subject areas, including employment relationships, data privacy, consumer rights and relational contracts. Each of the four problems that we work on will include intensive, practical research training; in particular, the course will be covering free, practice-related research, government document research, international law and business research. The course aims to simulate decision-making challenges that you often don't face in law school, but frequently face in the real world. Students will produce several kinds of written work product, including client letters, informal government memos, corporate policy papers, and negotiation outlines. Students will also give oral group presentations to a "client," a "politician" and the "executive board of a for-profit company." You will be expected to be available for group work from 8:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. each day except Friday (when we will end by 4:00 p.m.). You will also have (often a lot of) work to do in the evenings after 6:00 p.m.

Note: This class requires you to complete several tasks before the first day of class on January 9. Those tasks will be sent to you by email on December 22 and January 4. Be sure to check your email to get that important information. You may take the course for 2 or 3 credits; students taking it for 3 credits will be assigned some supplemental reading and be required to complete a short paper, which will be due Friday, March 17th. Please take the 2 vs. 3 credit question seriously, as it is very difficult (and sometimes impossible) to switch later.

If you enroll in the course and later decide not to take it, you must drop it no later than <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>December 28</u>, at 3:00 pm or you will be charged full tuition for the course unless another student takes your seat. Priority for this class will be given to third-year students and students seeking the Praxis Certificate. First-year students may not take this class.

THE AMERICAN JURY (2 or 3 credits)

Prof. Marder Course number: 423-01 Monday, January 9 - Saturday, January 14

Pass/fail not available. This intensive course will examine every stage of the jury process, including summoning of prospective jurors, voir dire, peremptory challenges, jury instructions, jury deliberations, and post-verdict interviews with the judge. In addition, the course will begin with a brief history of the jury and will end with two unusual features of the American jury – the hung jury and the nullifying jury. The course will follow the framework developed in Prof. Marder's new book, *The Power of the Jury: Transforming Citizens into Jurors*, which examines every stage of the jury process from the jurors' perspective and strives to make juries more diverse. The course will also include what the Supreme Court has said about each stage of the jury process so that students will also be well-versed in the law by the end of the course. Finally, students will have experience doing what lawyers do for each stage of the jury process, such as asking voir dire questions and drafting jury instructions, and will also observe and analyze actual recorded jury deliberations, which lawyers cannot do.

The class will meet for 6 days from 10 a.m. - 12 p.m. and from 1 p.m. - 3 p.m. with a break for lunch. Students taking the course for 2 credits will complete a short take-home exam by Monday, January 16. Students taking the course for 3 credits will write a research paper (which can satisfy your seminar writing requirement) during the Spring 2023 semester.

If you enroll in the course and later decide not to take it, you must drop it by <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>December 28</u>, or you will be charged full tuition for the course unless another student takes your seat. The course will entail reading beforehand, reading throughout the week, and independent viewing of jury deliberations in preparation for the class during which they will be discussed. This course will be of particular benefit to students who want to become trial lawyers, trial judges, policymakers, or just well-informed jurors when they are called to serve.
