Second-year students in the **part-time Day Division** should register for one of the Legislation sections listed above.

Legal Writing 3 and Legal Writing 4

Day Division students are required to take Legal Writing 3 and Legal Writing 4 during their second year. **Legal Writing 3** provides an introduction to researching and writing about non-litigation transactional issues and documents, with additional emphasis on oral communication with colleagues and clients. All sections of Legal Writing 3 are offered as General Practice sections. **Legal Writing 4** focuses on advanced research and writing skills in a variety of doctrinal areas and on creating legal instruments common to these areas. All second-year Day Division students were required to take Legal Writing 3 in the Fall semester, except for those who took a Legal Writing 4 Equivalency Class. Students who took an Equivalency Class in the Fall, and deferred Legal Writing 3, must register for Legal Writing 3 this semester. All other second-year Day Division students must register for Legal Writing 4 this semester.

Pass/fail not available. This intensive class explores the doctrine and process of labor arbitration, employment mediation and employment arbitration. Students will participate in selecting neutral arbitrators, prepping for and conducting labor arbitrations, an employment mediation and an employment arbitration. There will be comments, critiques and suggestions at every step along the way. The condensed schedule should help you focus on mediation and arbitration as you would in real life. Class will meet for approximately 21 hours during the week (the hours will vary depending on the day, and there will be no in-person class session on Wednesday in order for the students to prepare for the rest of the week), with approximately 6 hours of additional instruction through distance learning techniques. If you enroll in the course and later decide not to take it, you must drop it no later than Wednesday, December 27, or you will be charged full tuition for the course unless another student takes your place. Priority for this class will be given to students seeking the Labor and Employment Law Certificate or the Workplace Litigation and Alternative Dispute Resolution Certificate.

INTENSIVE TRIAL ADVOCACY 1 (3 credits)

Prerequisite: Evidence. Pass/fail not available. This is an intensive week-long version of the regular Trial Advocacy 1 class. Classes will meet from 8:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. each day, including the intervening Sunday. If you enroll in the course and later decide not to take it, you must drop it by Wednesday, December 27, or you will be charged full tuition for the course unless another student takes your seat. **Note: You must take Trial Advocacy 2 in the Spring semester if you take Intensive Trial Advocacy.**

THE AMERICAN JURY (2 or 3 credits)

Monday, January 8 - Saturday, January 13

Pass/fail not available. The class will meet for 6 days from 10 am - 12 noon and from 1 pm - 3 pm with a break for lunch. The class is being offered either for regular course credit (either 2 credits or 3 credits) or for seminar credit (3 credits).

Course option: Students taking the course option for 2 credits will complete a short take-home exam by Monday, January 15. Students taking the course option for 3 credits will either (1) complete the take-home exam by Monday, January 15, and write a short paper (about 10 pages) during the Spring semester; or (2) complete the take-home exam by Monday, January 15, and observe a jury selection in a nearby courthouse during the Spring semester and submit a memo with their findings.

Seminar option: Third-year and fourth-year students who wish to use the class to satisfy the seminar graduation requirement can take this course for three credits and write a seminar paper during the Spring semester; *this option is available only with permission of the professor (email nmarder@kentlaw.iit.edu).*

This intensive course will examine every stage of the jury process, including summoning of prospective jurors, voir dire, peremptory challenges, jury instructions, jury deliberations, and post-verdict interviews with the judge. In addition, the course will begin with a brief history of the jury and will end with two unusual features of the American jury – the hung jury and the nullifying jury. The course will follow the framework developed in Prof. Marder's new book, *The Power of the Jury: Transforming Citizens into Jurors*, which examines every stage of the jury process from the jurors' perspective and strives to make juries more diverse. The course will also include what the Supreme Court has said about each stage of the jury process so that students will also be well-versed in the law by the end of the course. Finally, students will have experience doing what lawyers do for each stage of the jury process, such as asking voir dire questions and drafting jury instructions, and will also observe and analyze actual recorded jury deliberations, which lawyers cannot do.

If you enroll in the course and later decide not to take it, you must drop it by Wednesday, December 27, or you will be charged full tuition for the course unless another student takes your seat. The course will entail reading beforehand, reading throughout the week, and independent viewing of jury deliberations in preparation for the class during which they will be discussed. This course will be of particular benefit to students who want to become trial lawyers, trial judges, policymakers, or just well-informed jurors when they are called to serve.
