If you enroll in the course and later decide not to take it, you must drop it by Friday, July 19, or you will be charged full tuition for the course unless another student takes your seat. **Note:** You must take Trial Advocacy 2 in the regular Fall semester if you take Intensive Trial Advocacy.

SOFTWARE PATENTS: A PRACTICAL PERSPECTIVE (2 credits) - Prof. Sutton

Course number: 126-01

Monday, August 12 - Friday, August 16, 2024

Classes will meet from 9:00-12:00 noon and 2:00-5:00 p.m. each day. There are no prerequisites for the course, although some familiarity with computers and software could be helpful. This course will address ongoing changes to the laws of patentable subject matter, indefiniteness, and divided infringement, and the practical implications of these changes on software patents. The course will also address the evolution of software innovation being protected, discussing how artificial intelligence and large language models in particular are impacting the industry. After an introduction to both patents and software, the course will focus on the Supreme Court decisions in Alice Corporation Pty. Ltd. v. CLS Bank International, Nautilus, Inc. v. Biosig Instruments, Inc., and Limelight Networks, Inc. v. Akamai Technologies, Inc., as well as the related case law. During the course, students will learn practical techniques to analyze existing software patent claims relating to modern software innovation based on these areas of developing law to form opinions regarding patent validity and patent infringement, and to suggest changes that could eliminate issues that may arise regarding invalidity and non-infringement.

CLINICAL EDUCATION COURSES

Permission is required for admission to all clinical programs. All In-House and Externship clinical programs are graded on a pass/low pass/fail basis only, with the exception of Pretrial Litigation, Intensive Clinic, and Intensive Clinic seminar, which are graded on a letter grade basis. Students are expected to put in a minimum of 182 hours (an average of 14 hours a week for 13 weeks) for 4-credit In-House Clinics and for Externships (in addition to the classroom component), and a minimum of 143 hours (an average of 11 hours a week for 13 weeks) for 3-credit In-House Clinics. Students must be available at the days and times designated below to meet with supervising attorneys and at other times as required by the supervising attorneys.
