Legal Writing 3

Second-year Day Division students must register for Legal Writing 3 in the Fall semester, unless you qualify to take a Legal Writing 4 Equivalency Class (see below). Legal Writing 3 provides an introduction to researching and writing about non-litigation transactional issues and documents, with additional emphasis on oral communication with colleagues and clients. All sections of Legal Writing 3 are offered as General Practice sections. In the Spring semester, you will take Legal Writing 4, which focuses on advanced research and writing skills in a variety of doctrinal areas and on creating legal instruments common to these areas. *Note:* Additional sections of Legal Writing 3 are listed on the Evening Division schedule.

Legal Writing 4 Equivalency Classes

Students on Law Review, or who are taking Appellate Advocacy (Moot Court Honor Society), Criminal Litigation 1, Pretrial Litigation, or are doing Judicial Externships, may satisfy the Legal Writing 4 requirement <u>either</u> by taking a regular Legal Writing 4 class in the Spring, <u>or</u> by taking a Legal Writing 4 Equivalency Class this semester. If you take an Equivalency Class this semester, you may take Legal Writing 3 in either Fall or Spring. There will be an initial class session (day/time TBA); the rest of the course will be conducted asynchronously online. The introductory session will be recorded for anyone unable to attend due to a conflict. **Please note:** The Equivalency Class must be taken in the same semester as the activity that qualifies you to take the Equivalency Class; you may not defer the Equivalency Class to a later semester.

CLINICAL EDUCATION COURSES

Permission is required for admission to all clinical programs. All In-House and Externship clinical programs are graded on a pass/low pass/fail basis only, with the exception of Pretrial Litigation, Intensive Clinic, and Intensive Clinic seminar, which are graded on a letter grade basis. Students are expected to put in a minimum of 182 hours (an average of 14 hours a week for 13 weeks) for 4-credit In-House Clinics and for Externships (in addition to the classroom component), and a minimum of 143 hours (an average of 11 hours a week for 13 weeks) for 3-credit In-House Clinics. Students must be available at the days and times designated below to meet with supervising attorneys and at other times as required by the supervising attorneys.
